#### This term in the Robins have been learning how to tell 'Traditional Tales'.




#### Making our own compost

# **Nutcracker Party**


Blackbirds enjoyed retelling the Nutcracker story through music this term.

They were joined by a giant mouse king and found out how they could retell the story through music. All were dressed in wonderful costumes and had a great time.

All had fun joining in actions and music which they put to telling this well known story.







### Ice Ice Robins

This term Robins have had fun moving to a variety of music (from Vivaldi and Strauss to pop music) with tubes and scarves. On the theme of winter and snow they have learnt about rhythm patterns and how we can make them from words. They enjoyed playing along to the 'Snow Day Song' playing the rhythms of 'ice', 'snowman' and 'winter wonder' on drums and other sound makers from home. During Storytelling Week we listened to 'Peter and the Wolf' by Prokofiev and learnt how the composer uses different instruments in an orchestra and different melodies to tell a story.



## **Rock It Peacocks!**

Peacocks started the term learning 'We will rock you' a song about the Stone Age, to the music of Queen. We played different ostinato patterns using body percussion and things around the house and found ways of writing our patterns down. They also explored different pitches from things at home as well. They had a go at chair drumming to the music of Queen which was fun! During Storytelling Week, they explored how the composer Mussorgsky used different instruments and effects to tell the scary story of 'A Night on the Bare Mountain'.

# Zak's Hedgehog Diary (Term 3 update) Hedgehog Update - 10<sup>th</sup> February 2021

We now have 10 hedgehogs that we are overwintering and live in our garage. We've had them for several months now but it's still too cold for them to go outside. We've got 2 large hutches with 6 in one and 4 in the other – they are all named and we tell them apart by putting coloured nail varnish on their spines. We've tried to keep the hogs together in the groups we found them in, but have mixed together a set of 4 and a pair that were found in our neighbours garden last November. We've called them Bev & Glen after our neighbours! We also had another 4 but we passed these to our friends to look after as my friend Mia also wanted to help look after them – until then she'd kept garden snails as a pet!

By about 8pm every day, there's always one hog who's out in the hutch looking for its dinner. We feed them every night with cat food and biscuits and by morning all the food has been gobbled up. They are all gradually putting on weight and the heaviest is now about 1 kilo. It's really funny, if they're out in the hutch when you go in the garage, instinct takes over and they freeze like a game of musical statues – they can be in all sorts of positions with faces out through the bars or half climbing up the sides, but they remain frozen in position until you leave – or if they do move – they scurry back into their undercover bed area.

We clean the hutches out several times every week (they are very messy and smelly and poo everywhere!) this gives us a chance to weigh the hogs and check them over to ensure they are fit and healthy. We keep a log of their weights on a spreadsheet and keep an eye on any who's weight goes down as they may have a medical problem or be suffering from internal parasites.

At Christmas, our dog Buddy found a hedgehog in our garden – we brought him in and looked after him, but soon realised he was blind and was poorly with what is called "Lung worm" It is an internal parasite that can cause lots of health problems for Hogs. We gave him medication every day and a weekly lung worm injection and did our best to care for him, keep him warm and comfortable, but unfortunately, he took a turn for the worse and passed away, the lung worm was too far gone for us to treat. It was very sad, but we realise that we are doing our best and had the hog remained in the garden, he was too small to have survived the winter on his own, at least he got some cuddles and love from us and was pain-free. All hogs have parasites (they get them from eating slugs) and can survive in harmony, however, if the worms become too great in number or if the hog suffers an illness or shock, the effect of the worms can become too much for the hog to cope with and it starts to suffer from the effects. The worms lay eggs and these can be seen in their poo. You can check for eggs using a microscope – if there are lots – you know that the hog will need treatment. Mummy and daddy prepare the slides and Its always my job to use the microscope to find any worms, it's very fascinating!

Some of the hogs are quite tame now and don't mind us picking them up, some still curl up tight in a ball to protect themselves squashing our hands, but Sonic Sparkle always enjoys a fuss — he's Dad's favourite and he loves a cuddle and stroke!

As soon as the temperature rises and is consistently between 6-10 degrees for 10 days the hogs will be able to be released back into the wild. (Mrs Jerome does not know this yet, but we are hoping to release some hogs in our school wildlife area, but I will leave Daddy to talk to her nearer the time as our school pond will need to be checked to ensure they could escape if they fell in and we would need to build a hog house!. Hogs are really good swimmers and climbers, but ponds with high sides can stop them from getting out.)

Until then we'll enjoy the snuffles and experience that these prickly creatures offer

In my next update, I will share with you how to prepare your gardens for when hogs come out of hibernation and what to do when you find one!
