




In our maths lesson we have been learning to use lots of different manipulatives to help us with our addition, subtraction, multiplication and division.

They have really enjoyed their science. Using all different electrical components to try out and design their own electrical circuits. They were all very keen to share their observations of what happened if they removed or added different parts and how these affected their circuits.

It's Not Just Music!

It's about how it makes you feel, how it makes you move and how much fun it can be for everyone. And Mrs White really does make it a wonderful experience for every child.

Every class has been busy this term singing, moving and playing instruments together.

Robins have been exploring sounds through songs and music about minibeasts. They had fun playing instruments to 'The Grasshopper Dance' and 'Flight of the Bumble Bee.' They love singing 'Caterpillar'! Ask them to sing it for you and do the actions!





Blackbirds have been exploring pitch- they have been playing xylophones and chime bars and made patterns of high, middle and low sounds.





Peacocks have made a great start on the ukulele. They have learnt to strum and play the strings separately to create tunes. They loved playing 'The Thumb Brush Strum!





Eagles have continued to make music using recorders, drums and other percussion. They have learnt three pieces to accompany their play of Romeo and Juliet and also learnt about folk music. They've had a great time learning a traditional Morris stick dance.



Zak's Hedgehog Diary

Having released all of our hedgehogs in March a couple of them have set up home in the hedgehog

houses that we've hidden under the trees in the garden. The others have wandered off and found themselves another cosy spot to set up home.



Hedgehogs like to build their nests at the base of thick hedges, under bramble bushes, garden sheds or piles of rubbish. If you don't have anywhere like this in your garden, it's really easy to build a safe and snuggly home for hedgehogs (but it needs to be out of sunlight).

Why don't you make a home for hedgehogs during Half Term!

Build a log pile, bug house or compost heap. One of the best features for encouraging all kinds of wildlife – and so easy to make. It will encourage insects and provide nesting opportunities all year

round.



We used a pallet as the base for our bug house and there's definitely a hedgehog living inside the pallet at the bottom!

We stuffed it with straw and hay so it's got somewhere warm and cosy to snuggle up.

Spring has Sprung!

Now is the time of year when female hedgehogs will be making their nests getting ready for their babies to be born. If you see a hedgehog out and about in the daytime – as long as they are alert, and walking with purpose – leave them alone as they may be gathering moss, leaves, straw and grass for their nests.

If you see a hedgehog sat out in the sunshine – it's a sign there's something wrong – they don't sunbathe! If the hedgehog appears lame and confused or is visibly injured – please place the hedgehog in a box, keep it warm with a towel and ensure it has a dish of fresh water and contact a local rescue to ask for help.

Hogs are great at hiding and easily get hurt

Check before strimming. Many people tidy up their gardens and use strimmers to cut back long grass and weeds – please check before doing this as hogs won't run away and many are badly injured, suffer horrific injuries or even die if they are caught by the strimmer line.

Be careful with bonfires. A hedgehog might be snuggled up under piles of debris — either build it your bonfire on the day of burning or move it before setting it alight to avoid a tragic end.



Finally - Don't squash me!

We're no stranger to seeing a squashed hedgehog on the road – especially in Summer months. Each year up to 335,000 hedgehogs are estimated to die on British roads.

If you see a hedgehog crossing the road – they will not run away – please don't run them over!

Hopefully Hartlip will be able to have some visits from some new prickly friends next school year.
























Congratulations! Radiant Reds
