



Minutes of meeting - Friday 11th December 2015

progress towards 50% lessons - teaching and learning consistently outstanding. We would love to exceed this target to 100%. A parent asked if the same concerns tend to come up on questionnaire. NT confirmed this is the case around bullying and behaviour. However, Term 1 was an improvement on Term 6 and it is hoped Term 2 will be an improvement on Term 1 following anti-bullying week.

These issues were discussed. Lunch time club rotates from class to class and is particularly popular in Robins Class room. Mr Barrett allows the children to play with classroom resources



KLZ is 'taking off'. It has been a little slow with log in issues but we are getting there! Families reported that they liked this facility and found it useful


Target Tracker is being implemented by teachers. A little slower than anticipated. Staff needed to be allocated a laptop to allow home working etc...

The Nativity production caused a few issues. The HT explained that a clear balance must be established between continued high quality and regular teaching and learning with celebrations. Historically Hartpury School performed two productions at Christmas - Key Stage 1 and Key Stage 2, with year 6 taking prominent parts, almost seen as a 'rite of passage'. To realise quality, this takes almost a term's work. In achieving a balance, the HT explained this amount of time cannot be attributed to a school production (s) at this stage in the year. Year 6 have not yet received their secondary school allocations. School may be requested to support in appeals. The children need high quality teaching and learning. In addition they are aiming towards their National Assessments in May. Continued learning must be a priority. Likewise year 5 are in a very important year, aiming towards secondary school curriculum, year 3 and 4 is preparation for year 5 and of course year 2 undertake National tests in May. The HT felt the correct balance was realised in 'Nesanna Rock'. HT felt the church school, sharing the Christian message. The entire school community took part. Families in attendance received this well. There has been feed-back that Nesanna Rock was just a well performed assembly, and a huge disappointment to year 6. However, this year we will have for the first time a year 6 production. Families looked forward to this.


July 2015 messages




PARENTS FELT THAT THE PROBLEM HAD GONE BEYOND THE POINT OF JUST BEING ABOUT AN INDIVIDUAL CHILD'S BEHAVIOUR, BUT THAT OF THE SCHOOL NOT GIVING A CLEAR AND CONSISTENT MESSAGE TO THE CHILDREN IN WHAT BEHAVIOUR IS ACCEPTABLE. A GOVERNOR ASKED WHAT STEPS THEY SAW AS AN ACCEPTABLE NEXT ACTION, TO WHICH AT LEAST ONE PARENT STATED EXCLUSION.
