



Talking to your child is the best way to keep

them safe



Your child will:

- talk to someone with a social network
- Go to tea with someone
- Have a sleepover



Basically...

That means:

- In Blackbirds and Robins 3 children have a social network profile
- In Peacocks and Eagles 12 children have a social network profile

Social networks, apps and games: what's popular?

Children and young people use social networks to:

- share photos and images
- message each other (sometimes in a group)
- chat with people via video
- make voice calls
- share content
- meet new people and chat to strangers
- play games

What's popular changes all the time.







Talk about how they can stay safe on social networks

Ask your child if they know:

- where reporting functions are
- how to block someone
- how to keep information private.

Show them how to do these things. Use Net Aware to help you.

Talk about online privacy, and being <u>Share Aware</u>. Explain that online behaviour – including sharing personal information – should mirror behaviour in person.

Explain that talking to strangers isn't always 'bad', but they should always be careful about what they share and sometimes people aren't who they say they are.

Safety starts with you

You can also help your child by simply setting a good example online. It might not always feel like it, but your child does notice how you act and follow your lead. So it's important to show them what safe sharing looks like.



9.5. Responding to concerns regarding cyberbullying

- Cyberbullying, along with all other forms of bullying, of any member of Hartlip School community will not be tolerated. Full details are set out in the school policies regarding anti-bullying and behaviour.
- All incidents of online bullying reported will be recorded.
- There are clear procedures in place to investigate incidents or allegations and support anyone in the school community affected by online bullying.
- If the school is unclear if a criminal offence has been committed then the Designated Safeguarding Lead will obtain advice immediately through the Education Safeguarding Team and/or Kent Police.
- Pupils, staff and parents/carers will be advised to keep a record of cyberbullying as evidence.
- The school will take steps to identify the bully where possible and appropriate. This may include
 examining school system logs, identifying and interviewing possible witnesses, and contacting the service
 provider and the police, if necessary.
- Pupils, staff and parents/carers will be required to work with the school to support the approach to cyberbullying and the schools e-Safety ethos.
- Sanctions for those involved in online or cyberbullying may include:
 - Those involved will be asked to remove any material deemed to be inappropriate or offensive.
 - A service provider may be contacted to remove content if those involved refuse to or are unable to delete content.
 - Internet access may be suspended at school for the user for a period of time. Other sanctions for pupils and staff may also be used in accordance to the schools anti-bullying, behaviour policy or Acceptable Use Policy.
 - Parent/carers of pupils involved in online bullying will be informed.
 - The Police will be contacted if a criminal offence is suspected.







9.6. Responding to concerns regarding online hate

- Online hate at <u>Hartlip</u> School will not be tolerated. Further details are set out in the school policies regarding anti-bullying and behaviour
- All incidents of online hate reported to the school will be recorded.
- All members of the community will be advised to report online hate in accordance with relevant school
 policies and procedures e.g. anti-bullying, behaviour etc.
- The Police will be contacted if a criminal offence is suspected. If the school is unclear if a criminal offence
 has been committed then the Designated Safeguarding Lead will obtain advice immediately through the
 Education Safeguarding Team and/or Kent Police.
